





## WINDHOEK DECLARATION OF AFRICAN FIRST LADIES/SPOUSES ON CERVICAL, BREAST AND PROSTATE CANCER

# MOVING FORWARD TO END CERVICAL CANCER BY 2030: UNIVERSAL ACCESS TO CERVICAL CANCER PREVENTION

**WE,** the African Ladies/Spouses, Parliamentarians and Ministers, meeting at the 8th Stop Cervical, Breast and Prostate Cancer Conference in Windhoek, Namibia, from 20 to 22 July 2014;

**DEEPLY CONCERNED** about the rise in communicable and non communicable diseases generally and cervical, breast and prostate cancer morbidity and mortality in Africa in particular;

**CONCERNED** that the burden of cervical cancer has become a growing health problem and is a leading cause of death amongst women;

**RECALLING** the recommendations by the African Heads of State and Government Summit held in Malabo in 2014 to integrate HIV and AIDS and maternal and child health and the advancement of the African Common Position on the post 2015 development agenda; African Youth Charter and the Protocol to the African Charter on Human and Peoples' Rights on the Rights of Women in Africa;

**NOTING** the various initiatives undertaken by various African Governments and their partners in the combating and management of cancer of the cervix, breast and prostate.

ALSO RECALLING the achievements of the previous conferences on cervical, breast and prostate cancer;

**DETERMINED** to fully implement programmes geared towards the early detection and prevention of cancers;

**CONVINCED** that in order to address cancer, both short and long term measures will be required that encompasses awareness raising for the adoption of healthy lifestyles choices;

#### Hereby COMMIT to the following:

 REAFFIRM individually and collectively, our previous commitments aimed at stopping cancer;

- COMMIT ourselves to promote the development /implementation of evidence based sound health policies and programmes to combat cervical, breast and prostate cancers;
- INTENSIFY advocacy for adequate human, technical and financial resources to achieve universal access to HPV vaccinations, treatment and care for cervical, breast and prostate cancers;
- PROMOTE awareness and dissemination of accurate health information through working together with religious, traditional and community leaders and civil society organizations and the media;
- REDOUBLE our efforts to mitigate misconceptions and stigma attached to cancer and integrate cervical, breast and prostate cancers, HIV and AIDS and maternal and child health programmes;
- SUPPORT the efforts of our Governments to enhance the participation of African research institutes, universities, civil society, private sector and other relevant stakeholders to support cancer prevention and treatment programmes in Africa;
- 7. ADVOCATE for further support to the Forum of African First Ladies/Spouses Against Cervical, Breast and Prostate Cancer to give visibility to non-communicable diseases by creating awareness about cancer in Africa;
- PROVIDE STEWARDSHIP as First Ladies/Spouses, Parliamentarians and Ministers to intensity awareness and efforts towards ending cervical cancer and AIDS by 2030;
- COLLABORATE with bilateral, multilateral partners and the private sector to ensure the availability of technical and financial support in the prevention, control and treatment of cervical, breast and prostate cancers;
